Robin's Winter Adventure Story Folder

A simple folder can be created to send home with and a printed out story of the play and key words sheet.

Other linked books could be included e.g.

- Birds to Spot (Usborne Minis) a simple illustrated guide to common UK garden birds
- Coming Home by Michael Morpurgo a story beautifully illustrated by Kerry Hyndman that teaches about robin migration
- Moving Molly by Shirley Hughes
- My New Home by Marta Altés

For children for whom English is their second language, include translations of key words in the child's home language in the story folder. (You can find translations on google translate. This may seem time consuming but is essential for EAL children to connect with the story.)

Personal, Social and Emotional Development

Moving

The theme of moving makes a relevant discussion topic for Early Years:

- What did Robin feel about moving?
- How did he feel about changing schools?
- Who in the group has moved house?
- How do they feel about moving to infant school?

Moving House Drama Game

Each child imagines they are driving a removal van. They must follow instructions: left, right, stop, go.

Set up London and Little Fressingham (or 'old house' and 'new house') on opposite sides of the hall. When the relevant word is called all the vans need to drive to their destination as quickly as they can.

What sounds do the vans make as they start, stop and drive? Do the vans have a special sound for reversing?

Zoom role play area

Set up a *Robin's Winter Adventure* role play area to encourage children to immerse themselves in the story world.

By involving the children in setting up the role play area, and listening to their suggestions they are more likely to engage with the activity. Photograph the area as it develops and children playing within the area.

Resources: Moving boxes and summer and winter clothes / toys to divide between them, pots, spades, 'soil', 'plants' and 'seeds' (real or pretend depending on outdoor/indoor play), notebooks and pens.

The role of the adult is to observe how children engage, noting language, interaction, negotiation, cooperation, sharing, turn-taking and to model emotional coaching and sustained shared thinking to reflect on and develop ideas.







Understanding the World

Robins

Why not create a space outside with a nut hanger for birds and a bird bath, and see if you can spot a robin. Collect and display in the classroom found feathers, or any found empty eggs (never from nests!).

Bird Spotting

Looking at robins could lead to a class 'bird spot', at school or home - why not create a class tally chart using cut out bird shapes to record the birds you spot. Pupils could also draw, paint or model the birds they spot.

The RSPB website contains details of how to participate in their annual 'Big Schools Birdwatch', either at home or in setting.

Different Homes

In the play Robin moves from a house to a flat. Birds live in different homes altogether...

- What sort of homes do the children live in?
- What about birds?
- Pets?
- Animals in the wild?


CBeebies 'Our Planet' has a short video which looks at 'Different Types of Animal Homes'.

Can the children mimic any of the sounds?

Can the class work together to create a garden soundscape, mimicking the noises you might hear and introducing them one by one? (e.g. gentle rain, different birds, wind blowing, a dog or cat etc.)

Expressive Arts and Design

Model Houses

Can children build their own house, a dream house, a scale house for a favourite toy figure out of junk materials?

Why not use building bricks to build a variety of height towers, how do they compare? Why not draw a picture to record the different towers and their different heights?

Feathers

Design and make collage birds using feathers (bought or found). Try painting with feathers; using the plume end and also the quill end – can you make it into a pen for writing?

We hope that your class will be inspired to create around the themes of *Robin's Winter Adventure* and we would love to see the results.
